Advanced Placement Literature and Composition Course Description This course is designed to prepare students for the Advanced Placement Literature and Composition Exam.

Specifically, the course focuses on careful reading and critical analysis of literature (pre-20th and 20th/21st centuries). Texts will be examined through close reading as a means of understanding the methods authors use to provide pleasure and meaning for their audience. Textual structure, style, and theme will guide our analysis while literary devices (e.g., imagery, symbolism, tone) will also be emphasized. Big ideas in this course include Character, Setting, Structure, Narration, Figurative Language, and Literary Argumentation.

Writing assignments will include compositions carried through the steps of the writing process, short critical analyses, timed writings, and creative assessments. The class will also involve seminars, presentations, and informal evaluations of speaking & listening skills.

This course is designed to comply with the curricular requirements described in the College Board *AP English Course Description*, the *Common Core Curriculum*, and the *Wake County Curriculum*. Assignments and materials are aligned with each group standards. It is challenging and designed for students who are willing to do the work. Open-mindedness, maturity, motivation, respect, and commitment are all necessary to be successful in this course. We expect from this class hard work, careful reading, and animated class discussions. The more you put into this class, the more you will enjoy it and learn from it.

Course Progression

The course is divided into four units. Anchor texts of short fiction, poetry, drama, and novel choice will focus on specific ideas related to the **psychological impact of:**

Unit 1: Home & Family: Teacher-selected short fiction and poetry / student-selected novel choice

Unit 2: Identity & Culture: Teacher-selected Shakespearean play / student-selected novel choice / teacher selected short fiction and poetry

Unit 3: Conformity & Rebellion: Teacher-selected play or novel / student-selected novel or play choice / teacher selected short fiction and poetry

Unit 4: Tradition & Progress: Choice Novel, suggested list [HERE](#)/teacher-selected poetry

**All units will have texts available online. For student choice, there will always be AT LEAST one text in the Public Domain, so students won't need to purchase a book unless they choose a more recently published title.
